Restoration Waterproofing Contractors is working on the historic Lawrence Building in Hiawatha, KS, which was built in 1896 and is currently being restored by owner David Nachtigal.

While working on the Clock Tower building, (featured in the Fall 2009 issue of this newsletter) that's located across the street from the Lawrence Building, RWC's Shawn Smoke developed a plan with David Nachtigal to restore the exterior of his 1896 downtown classic.

Brick and terra cotta features on the Lawrence Building had been destroyed or damaged while installing metal cladding in a mid-century update. RWC replicated the original terra cotta columns, eyebrow, friezes, caps, and chimneys.

With the revitalization of the Clock Tower and Lawrence Building on the northwest corner of the Hiawatha square, RWC was also able to get in-



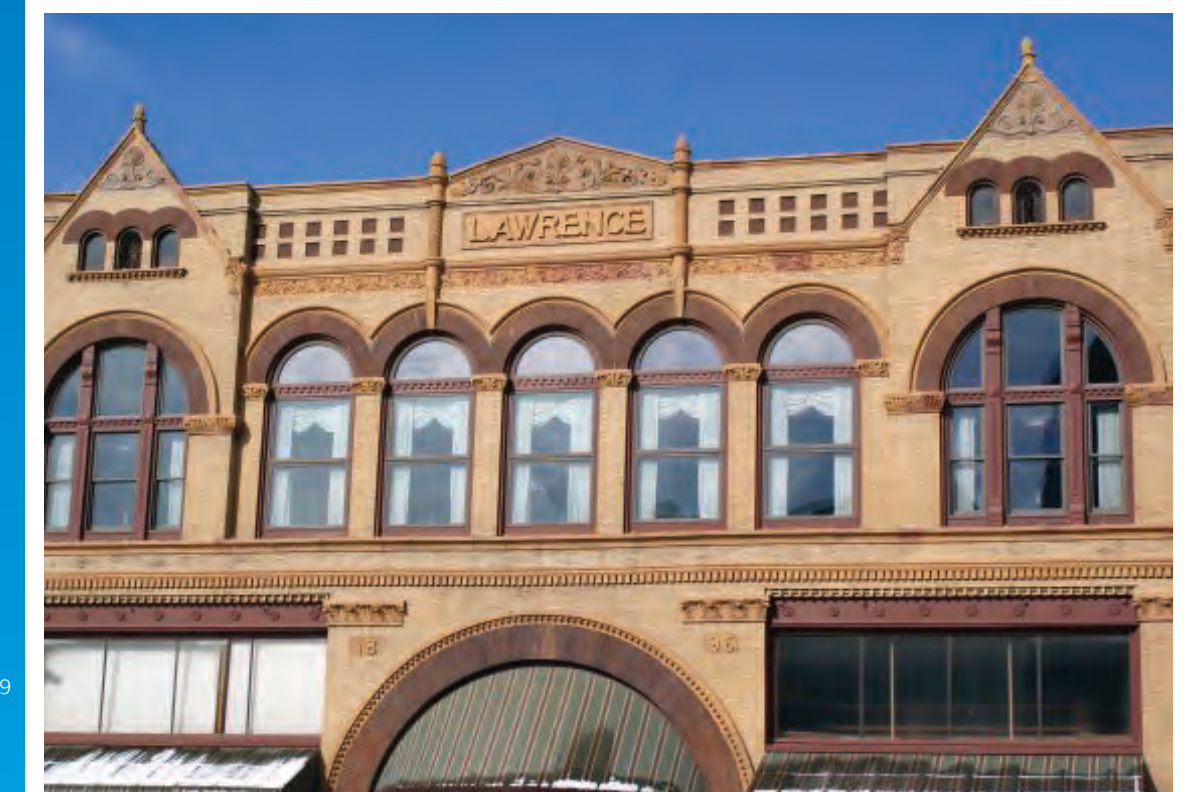
Hiawatha Lawrence Building Before

One thing the RWC Wichita office appreciates is that Jack is always willing to help the girls in the office move heavy boxes. "I just love working for RWC," he said.

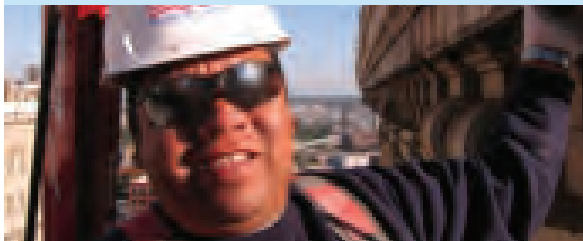

RWC'S EXTENDED FAMILY: OUR CATS WICHITA, KS

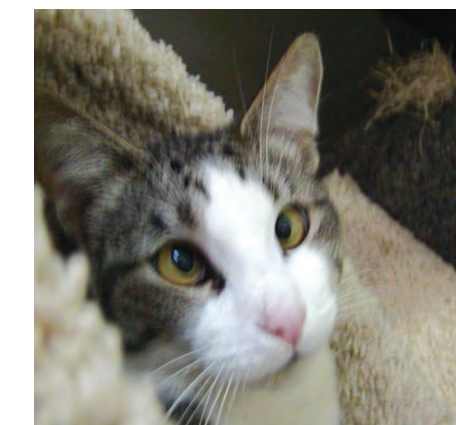

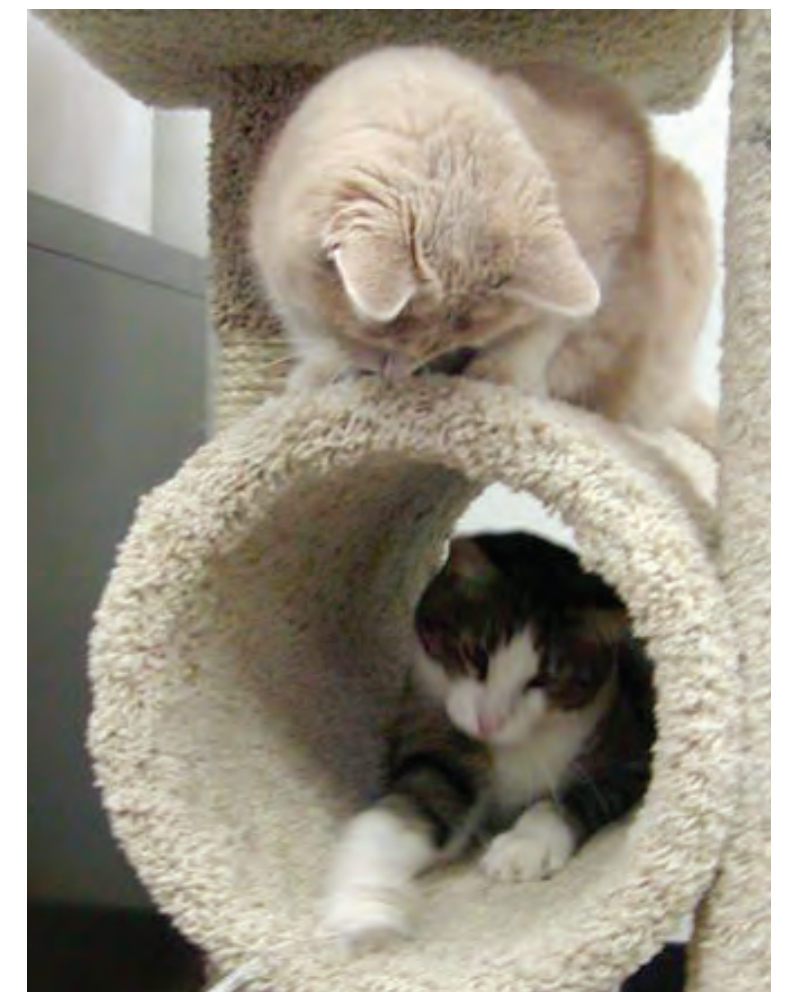
With energy conservation becoming a major factor in building construction, air and moisture barriers are being utilized widely in the industry.

RWC has been applying these systems for several years. Recently RWC joined the Air Barrier Association of America (ABAA) and has certified several installers to apply self-adhered and fluid-applied membranes.

There are numerous systems available and it seems more and different products are being specified on each new job. RWC's association with ABAA keeps us aware of the changes to the material and applications.
